


THE RAGING BULL

Tonino Lamborghini was born on the 13th of October 1947, in the North-East of Italy. He is the heir of the Lamborghini dynasty, being the only son of Ferruccio Lamborghini, the renowned businessman who created an industrial empire. In 1974, he obtained his degree in Political and Economic Sciences at the Italian University of Bologna to then dive right into the family's businesses. He has been president of the Lamborghini Oleodinamica Spa from 1974 to 2002 and president of Lamborghini Calor Spa from 1983 to 2003.

The man behind these words was Carlo Mollino, an Italian architect, designer, and photographer. He was born on May 6, 1905, in Turin, Piedmont, Italy. Ranging from well-crafted chairs, tables, and automobile designs to staged erotic portraits of women in his home studio, Mollino pursued an aesthetic appeal in all aspects of his life. He was once credited as saying, "Everything is permissible as long as it is fantastic." That credo was certainly reflected throughout his body of work. In 1930, Carlo Mollino started his career as an architect designing a house in Forte deiMarmi and receiving the G. Pistono prize for architecture. Over the following decades, he designed a number of buildings throughout Turin, including ski lodges, auditoriums, and apartments. Mollino's architecture and furniture are famous for their ability to enable occupants to manipulate volumes at a whim.




PORCELAIN V/S CERAMIC
